## **Purple Martins in Brentwood Park**

For the past several years, a dedicated team of volunteer citizen scientists and I have been collecting data and taking care of the Purple Martin Colony in Brentwood Park. This year, Mrs. Lee's 3rd graders from Brentwood Elementary have joined us at the colony for regular visits. The students are learning about migration, observation, and the life cycle of the Purple Martin. Each visit, the kids are eager to observe the changes happening inside the gourds. Just yesterday, they saw lots of leafy nests in the gourds! Next visit, maybe they'll see eggs! And soon... babies!

The Purple Martin Colony in Brentwood Park launched its 7th season this year on February 16th when the birds began to arrive from their wintering grounds in South America. Typically, the birds spend March preparing for the breeding season by selecting a mate, choosing a home, and building a bowl-shaped nest lined with live oak leaves. April is when the birds start laying eggs, anywhere from 3 to 8 eggs per nest. May is when the eggs start hatching and the colony gets very loud. In the park, you'll likely notice the parents tirelessly feeding flying insects to their babies. If you look closely, you'll see the young birds begging for food at the gourd openings with their mouths wide open. June is when the young birds start fledging (leaving the nest.) It's always a treat to see a young bird take its first flight followed closely by several attentive adults cheering it on and making sure it makes it to a safe perch. In July, the birds will start heading back south to Brazil. By August, the birds will be gone from the park. It will be strangely silent... until it all starts over again next February.

In the three years since 2015, the Brentwood Purple Martins have laid a total of 454 eggs, hatched 301 young and sent 258 fledglings out into the world to live their adventurous Purple Martin lives!

## **Bicycling in Brentwood**

Warmer weather means more bikes on the road! Stay safe and enjoy the ride while sharing space with cars and pedestrians. Bicyclists on the road must obey the same traffic laws as motorists, unless otherwise directed by a police officer or traffic signals, street signs and facilities specific to bicycles.

- Children ages 17 and under are required to wear a helmet while riding a bicycle
- Using a portable electronic device while operating a bicycle is prohibited
- Parked bicycles must not impede or obstruct pedestrian traffic on sidewalk paths
- Parked bicycles must not be attached to public or private property in a manner that may damage the property
- Riding a bicycle on a sidewalk is generally allowed, but it is prohibited in parts of downtown and the University

of Texas campus

To be visible at night, a bicyclist must have:
 A front white light visible from at least 500 feet in the front and a red reflector or red light in the rear

#### **Bicycle Safety Tips**

- · Always ride with traffic, never against it
- Obey traffic signs and signals, and observe others' rightof-way
- Use hand signals to tell motorist and pedestrians what you intend to do
- Don't pass other vehicles within the same lane
- · Don't ride more than two bicycles abreast
- Stay visible, predictable and assertive
- Control speed on Austin's trails, and give 3 feet when passing


# CodeNEXT - Version 3 Neighborhood Implications


Austin's Land Development Code is being rewritten after 30 years of updates and amendments. It uses zones to regulate what can be built where. The third version of CodeNEXT was released in February with updated documents and maps. **V3** is significantly different from the previous two versions. Public involvement and input is critical to "getting this right", as the mayor puts it.

The residential (**R**) codes are reformulated, and the commercial codes are modified with additions. Some areas retain legacy **F25** zoning. The **R** code is supposed to be uniform for the "whole city", but the different subcategories are designed for either the urban core or the more suburban areas of Austin. Almost the entire city would be up-zoned. With few exceptions, there would no longer be any single-family (**SF**) zoning as we now know it. At over 1,500 pages of complex and inconsistent language, this draft has failed to simplify our current code. City staff has continually refused to chart the changes from current code to new code.

Most of the areas of town which had "transect zoning" in version 1 now have more intense (R2) zoning. R2A and R2C have been placed in the more central city, while R2B has been placed in the more suburban areas. Currently zoned SF-2 areas, which allow a home but no additional dwelling unit (ADU), would allow two units on every lot - a single-family house and an ADU, or a duplex on a corner lot. The new map converts current SF-3 lots to R2C, which permits a house and an ADU on significantly smaller lots. Many neighborhoods that now have uniform zoning throughout would have "spot zoning. For example, Brentwood SF-3 lots have been zoned to R4A, and Allandale SF-2 lots have been rezoned to R4B. R4 contains densities of 60 or more units per acre, which is higher than high density multi-family (MF-5) in current













zoning.

Under the current code, there are 9 **SF** housing zoning categories which range from one house to townhomes. The new code contains 17 categories which have 61-plus subclasses with differing development regulations, with lot sizes drastically reduced from current code down to 18-foot wide, 1,800 square foot lots. An attached single-family home is allowed by right on a 25-foot wide, 2,500 square foot lot in all R2 classes. In R2A and R2B, a single-family attached house plus an ADU is allowed on 5,000 square foot lots. In **R2C**, a single-family attached house is allowed with an ADU on a 3,500 square foot lots. These small lot sizes will greatly increase re-subdivisions and redevelopment. With resubdivision, a 10,000 square foot lot in R2A and R2B could have 4 units, and in **R2C**, only 7,000 square feet is required for 4 units. For lots less than 30 feet wide, there is no impervious cover limit for the front yard; these resubdivided lots could have 100% impervious cover in the front. This could greatly exacerbate flooding. While development potential is not absolute, CodeNEXT V<sub>3</sub> significantly increases the number of allowed units per acre.

Occupancy limits for duplexes would be rolled back to pre-2014 limits. Neighborhoods near the universities would once again face increased demolitions and stealth dorms.

Existing older apartment complexes that currently provide a significant amount of affordable housing in neighborhoods are impacted. Current **MF-3** zoning allows 36 units/acre. New **RM3** zoning allows 36 units/acre. However, if 2-10% of the units are "affordable", an additional 40 units/acre is allowed for a total of 76 units. These entitlements would incentivize demolition of existing older apartments, replacing them with more units but a minimum of affordable housing units.

There are also use changes in residential areas. While the Live/Work designation has been removed from the residential house scale zones, the Home Occupation Allowed Use has been expanded to include retail sales of any merchandise between 9 AM and 5 PM, and allows any home to be used as a business if one employee lives on site. An administratively-given Minor Use Permit (MUP) allows up to 3 additional workers in the house. Commercial vehicles may also be stored on the property if they are screened from the street. Signage is also allowed. There is a short list of excluded businesses including adult-oriented, automobile repair, bar/nightclub, restricted personal services and restaurants, but many other uses such as brew pubs, food stores, and alcohol sales would apparently be allowed as a home occupation (chapter 23 of the code lists excluded uses).

Residential parking would be cut in half and business parking is reduced from 20% to 60%, with additional reductions of 40% depending on location. In addition to bars, these uses require no parking if the use is less than 2,500 square feet: Office General (non-medical) in **MU** (Mixed Use) and **MS** (Main Street); Library, Museum, Art Gallery, Retail in **MS**; and Studio in **MS**. The planning director may also waive all on-site parking.

Compatibility standards are greatly reduced. Currently a

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120' tall building has to be 540' from a residential property. That setback has been reduced to 100'. This would significantly impact residences close to arterial roadways such as Burnet and Lamar.

Another compatibility issue is the location of businesses that impact the quality of life in neighborhoods. CodeNEXT V3 allows bars without special zoning and conditional use permits. Every property along Burnet Road from 38th Street to Hwy 183 could have a bar, and if it is in the **MS** category and is less than 2,500 square feet, no parking spaces are required. Locations of brew pubs have been extended into **MUI** classes that are next to homes.

The existing commercial zoning categories such as NO, LO, GO, LR, GR and CS have been eliminated in CodeNEXT and are replaced with 11 **MU** and 7 **MS** zones that carry forward commercial uses and permit the addition of residential uses. Importantly, the new zones do not simply add the availability of residential uses, they dramatically change what is allowed on existing commercially zoned property. The current Neighborhood Office zoning district, which was created for maximum compatibility with residential uses, has been eliminated. There is no longer any office zoning, as it has been combined with retail and entertainment zoning. Most corridors have also been given height increases of at least 25', many going from 60 up to 85 feet.

## **What is Acupuncture?**

Acupuncture is a type of therapy used by practitioners of traditional Chinese medicine (TCM). Chinese medicine is part of a spiritual tradition over 2,500 years old, emphasizing the importance of cultivating balanced energy in the body, mind, and spirit.




## **An Ounce of (Mosquito) Prevention** is Worth a Pound of Cures

There are many people new to our neighborhood — and new to the pests in Texas! Here are some tips to prevent mosquitoes from breeding and spreading before you resort to spraying pesticides in your yard. Despite claims, there is no evidence that either the "chemical" sprays or the "allnatural" mists can discriminate between target bugs (mosquitoes) and non-target bugs (ladybugs, bees, butterflies, dragon flies and lightning bugs).

#### **Remove Mosquito Habitats**

• Get rid of standing water in old tires, buckets, plastic covers, toys, gardening supplies, trash cans, moving boxes, canoes, wheelbarrows, ceramic frogs wearing tengallon hats, or any other outdoor container that can hold water



- Keep rain gutters clear of leaves and debris which can trap water and make sure down-spouts are not clogged
- Do not dump leaves or other debris into the arroyos, it clogs them. Make sure your lawn care people know this
- Empty and change water in bird baths, fountains and potted plant travs
- Ensure that shady areas and piles of leaves are not harboring mud or water
- Condensation from air conditioners may also create puddles and mud, especially if in the shade
- Empty kiddie pools daily or cover tightly at night
- Keep rain barrels covered with a tightly fitting mesh screen and treat with a natural larvicide (such as Mosquito Dunks)
- Make sure your outdoor faucets are not dripping or creating puddles
- Empty and change water in outdoor pet bowls daily
- Construction Sites! Lots of places to collect water. Ask to talk to the manager and have him/her make sure the workers clean up daily
- Keep swimming pool water treated and circulating Be neighborly — If YOU walk around your yard once a week emptying water, YOUR NEIGHBORS might be able to stay outside without bug repellent! And vice versa.

# Capitol School of Austin offering "Academic Redshirting" to Kindergartners

What is "Academic Redshirting"? We all know it, even if we may be unfamiliar with the term; it is the practice of holding back your "summer boy or girl" an extra year in preschool before moving to Kindergarten—allowing him or her that extra time to mature and develop, in order to hold a more competitive position in the classroom. The results of this practice are varied and disputed, therefore Capitol School of Austin offers a Head Start program for typically-developing children who might not be ready for the mainstream setting of a public Kindergarten class.

This program takes children that would ordinarily remain in preschool and places them in a low-ratio Kindergarten classroom where they receive more singular and focused attention from teachers in a safe and supportive environment. Then, at the end of the school year, the child can matriculate into public Kindergarten or straight to first grade, joining his or her age group—an option that would not be available in a traditional redshirting practice.

#### **Austin School Bus Cameras**

Drivers who illegally pass AISD buses will be issued \$300 tickets under the district's new school bus stoparm safety camera program. A school bus violation



occurs when a motorist passes a school bus after the school bus has come to a complete stop with its stop-arm extended and lights flashing.

State law requires drivers traveling in either direction to stop when approaching a stopped school bus that has its flashing lights on or its stop arm extended. If there is a concrete barrier or other median, drivers going in the opposite direction don't need to stop.

In the next year, all buses should have stop-arm cameras on AISD regular route buses.

- Cameras are installed at a key location on the exterior of each school bus
- When a school bus extends its stop-arm, the system can automatically detect if a vehicle passes the stopped school bus within the enforced zone
- If a vehicle passes the school bus, the cameras capture images and video of the violating vehicle
- The images show not only the violating vehicle as it passes the school bus, but also the vehicle's license plate and the school bus's extended stop arm. The system also records a video of the violating vehicle as further evidence of the violation
- Violation data and images are then wirelessly uploaded



# Two Step to Tango

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 A final review of the image and video is conducted by AISD's law enforcement personnel, who then will approve or reject the violation


