## BEING SAFE FROM DOGS RUNNING LOOSE

Mesa Park residents have been victims of unprovoked dog attacks in recent months. This problem came to the attention of the MPNA Board. Here are facts on the problem and advice on how to prevent it recurring. The victims were in their own vards or walking down the street when they were attacked by aggressive dogs that escaped from their Mesa Park residences and went on rampages. Some of the victims drove off their canine attackers without injury. But one victim was bitten and needed Emergency Room treatment. The dog responsible for that injury was taken by the authorities and "put down" (also called "being euthanized"), meaning the dog was killed. What if the victim had not been an adult, but a child? Or a family pet? And maybe not just bitten, but horribly bitten? Mauled? Mutilated? Crippled and traumatized for life? Killed? It could happen. At least 3 human deaths related to dog bites were reported in Texas in 2005, and at least 4 in 2004. Many serious injuries were reported, and countless minor injuries that nevertheless were painful and expensive. We must act prudently and swiftly to prevent such tragedies and troubles in OUR neighborhood. The first action is for DOG OWNERS. We are responsible for confining and controlling our dogs to prevent harm to persons and damage to property. The Law specifies criminal and civil penalties against the owner of a dog that runs loose and is a nuisance, or damages property, or injures a person or another animal, or even attacks without injuring. Penalties are even greater if the dog is not registered or vaccinated. And the dog itself may pay the ultimate penalty: its life. We love our dogs, but we MUST keep them safely confined, and walk them only on the leash, not off the leash. It's the Law. We should control them with firm, professionally-taught obedience training and kindness, not with harsh words and beatings. We MUST have them

registered and vaccinated as the Law requires. We owe it to our dogs, to ourselves, and to all the neighborhood. The second action is for EVERYBODY AND ANYBODY. How many times have we seen dogs running loose on the streets, and we did nothing? Not called Animal Control or the Police, but instead said or thought "It's wearing a collar. It must be somebody's pet. I don't want to make trouble for a neighbor. It's OK if it runs loose." We do that too often. But it is NOT OK. Maybe the collar carried an expired registration tag (dog license) or an expired vaccination tag and the dog is unregistered or diseased. Maybe the tag was not an official registration but was just a cute medallion from the Pet Store. Maybe the collar carried a special "Dangerous Dog" warning tag, for a dog that already had been "busted" by the Law for unprovoked attacks against persons. Such dogs are unpredictable and very dangerous. And what about dogs without collars? Are they ownerless strays? Or the beloved pets of irresponsible owners who do not register or vaccinate them? Diseased? Dangerous? Vicious? ANY dog running loose can be dangerous, especially if it is in a pack of two or more loose dogs. ANY dog bite can be painful and dangerous, even from a tiny Chihuahua biting a small child. Although four of the unprovoked attacks researched for this article were done by Pit Bulls running loose, victims also reported unprovoked attacks against themselves or against their own dogs by German Shepherds, Labradors, Dobermans, Chows, Boxers, Poodles, Dachshunds, Chihuahuas, and just plain mutts. And all the victims who escaped uniniured from attacking dogs that went on to attack another person said this: "IF ONLY ID CALLED 911 IN THE FIRST PLACE, THEN THE NEXT PERSON WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN HURT." Don't gamble when SAFETY IS AT STAKE FOR YOUR PETS, YOUR CHILDREN, AND YOURSELVES. REPORT LOOSE DOGS IMMEDIATELY. Call 311, the City of Austin's public safety Help Line for non-emergencies. Or call 911 if the situation is an emergency. The trained operators can send help to the scene within minutes, or even within seconds if a unit is nearby. Animal Control Officers and/or Police Officers can save you and yours from a dog attack. They can lock up dangerous or diseased or nuisance animals and give citations to irresponsible owners. They also can advise you about problems, and refer you to the proper channels for solving them. Do the right thing: IMMEDIATELY CALL 311 OR 911 AND REPORT ANY DOGS RUNNING LOOSE. You may save a person or pet you love from injury or death.

#### FALL IS THE BEST TIME TO PLANT A TREE

Many of the trees in Mesa Park, planted 30 years ago, were fast growing trees and they are nearing the end of their life span. The best time to plant trees is between October and March so that they have time to establish roots before long hot summer months.

Trees in our yards add beauty and so much more. Properly placed shade trees can reduce heating and cooling costs up to 30%, by providing shade for roofs and walls. Trees help to stabilize your neighborhood and add considerable value to our homes. Trees help clean the air, add beauty and color and are home to many different types of wildlife. With proper selection and placement, trees provide us with years of enjoyment as well as added value to property.
