At this month's Commander's Forum the guest speaker was Lt Littrell of the Austin Fire Department, which is an appropriate subject as our NW Commander was not present at this meeting. The Commander's house burned to the ground last month due to an electrical fire in the laundry room. Our thoughts are with him and his family and glad that everyone got out all right due to fire alarms. Lt. Littrell is with the Fire Arson department and he had very interesting stories of arsonist and non-arsonists fires in Austin in the past 5 years. Of course, he had the usual advice for everyone to please check the batteries in the fire alarms at often as remembered. The statistics last year here in the Austin area for the top five reasons for residential fires, as follows:

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# **MPNA Crime Stats**

At the last Commander's Forum, comments were made that there have been a big escalation of drive-bys that shoot out the windows of a SUVs in the Balcones Woods neighborhood. Here in Mesa Park, there has been one reported. The frustration is high on both sides, neighbor and police department. They have increased patrol, but no arrests have occurred. The police department requested neighborhood participation to help them, and would like any witness to call them with information. Should you observe anything that causes you suspicion, please note the day and time of the event, color of the car, approximate age/type of car, any detail of driver (male/female), number of people in the car. Even if you do not have a license plate your information could help.

- 5. Mechanical Malfunction: the only example I could find on the web was of a humidifier that had been recalled as it proved to be a fire hazard.
- 4. Kids playing with fire: Lt Littrell showed pictures of a fatal fire in a house in South Austin. Very tragic as it happened by setting the Christmas tree on fire.
- 3. Candles: easiest thing in world to forget to douse prior to either leaving the house or going to bed at night.
- 2. Smoking materials: if you do smoke, please ensure that your "smoking" area is all non-flammable materials.

And the number 1 reason for residential fires last year...

- 1. Electrical malfunctions: Electrical malfunctions include many reasons, and all are explained in detail and there is even a checklist to use in going through your house at the following website:

But this topic also segues into a past topic regarding Mesa Park neighborhood homes reaching the age of 25 years. If your house was built prior to 1974 the chances that you have aluminum wiring are very good. Since our newsletter article months ago regarding "Fixing the Wiring" by Caroline Meyer, there were 3 people who contacted us for information. Researching reveals that it not the aluminum wiring itself that is a problem, but where it connects to connection box for wall outlets, ceiling lights and ceiling fans. Where the aluminum wire meets the copper wire at the "connection" is where the failure occurs after certain years of expanding and contracting. Further research indicates that fixing this problem can range from hiring a service company (i.e. Fox Services) to use a patented connection technology on every electrical connection in your house (around \$4,000.00), to identifying the problem connections in your house and hiring an electrician to fix that one outlet (around \$75.00), to doing it yourself. In talking with a certified electrician, he indicated that the problem between the aluminum wire and copper connection point can be eliminated by installing a building grade connection and checking on a regular basis. - Keeping the poinsettia in a cool room (55-60 degrees) at night will prolong blooming time.
- Water when soil is dry to the touch and avoid over watering. Always remove plant from any decorator container before watering. Water only when soil is dry and allow to drain completely.
- Don't fertilize when plant is in bloom.

- 3. Seeds of most all spring annual flowers and vegetables can be sown indoors during January for later transplanting.
- 4. Be prepared to protect tender plants against a sudden cold snap. Water plants if a hard freeze is predicted.
- 5. Keep the lawn free of fallen leaves to prevent smothering the grass.
- 6. All dormant season pruning can be done now through late February. Use proper tools, make cuts close and clean. Wait on pruning gardenias, climbing roses, azaleas, camellias, and other spring flowering shrubs until after they bloom.
- 7. Apply dormant oil spray to control scale, and other hard-to-manage insect pests.
- 8. Prepare soil and beds for planting spring and summer annuals and perennials. Add organic materials, as needed.
- 9. This is the best month to prune oak trees to reduce possible spread of oak wilt fungus.
- 10. Apply light application of fertilizer to established beds of winter flowering annuals (pansy, calendula, snapdragon, etc.) Use one pound of 15-10-5 per 100 square feet of bed area.
- 11. Select and order gladiolus corms for February and March planting.
- 12. Check evergreen trees and shrubs to be sure they are not suffering from lack of moisture. Information provided by Travis County Extension Service 512-854-9600

### **Poinsettia Pointers**

### **Buying Tips:**

- Avoid plants with drying lower leaves or other signs of wilt. Look for dense, green foliage to the soil line
- The "blooms" of a poinsettia are actually colored leaves called bracts. The true flowers are the button-like parts at the base of the bracts. Look for green or red-tipped flowers; yellow pollens a sign of age.
- Protect from temperatures below 50 degrees when transporting.

#### Home Care:

- Remove paper or plastic sleeves around pots or plants to let the poinsettias breathe.
- Place plant in indirect sunlight. No part of the plant should touch cold window panes.
- Keep poinsettias away from warm or cold drafts, radiators or open windows. Ideal temperature is 60-70 degrees.
