Profile of a Mesa Park Neighbor

The following story is an excerpt from a family profile to be included in a book about life in the Panama Canal Zone that will be published by the Panama Canal Museum in August 2008.

When Bert Schroeter decided to return to the CZ in 1954, he was hired as an electrical engineer at a salary of \$5,256.25/year. The excitement of moving to a foreign country and sailing on a ship for the first time made up for the sadness of leaving friends & family behind. On May 18th, 1954 they sailed from NYC on the SS Panama. At that time, it was a seven day journey with a stop in the beautiful harbor of Port au Prince, Haiti, where many small boats clustered around the ship selling their handcrafted items. They landed at Christobal and Val & Suzie were escorted across the Isthmus on the train, while Bert waited for their care to be unloaded. They spent their first night in the historic Hotel Tivoli, Their first class room had a bare light bulb handing on a string from the ceiling. The next day, they drove to Gamboa to see their first quarters. It was an old, four-family building on stilts on the Ridge. It had no glass windows – only screens, with old metal furniture and an ice box with daily delivery of ice and milk. The toilet tank was mounted on the wall with a long pull chain. After only 2 months in Bamboa, Bert's previous service qualified them to move into a new 2 story, 3 bedroom, 1 ½ baths, concrete duplex.

Neighborhood Watch Block

How to start a neighborhood watch

Participation in a neighborhood watch program can help reduce crime in your area. To be eligible for a neighborhood watch sign, it is preferred that fifty percent of your neighborhood or block must attend one to three meetings where helpful information on personal and property crimes is shared. Tips include how to reduce your chances of being attacked. Contact your neighborhood association president, or the Austin Police Department at 974-4736.

Burglary Prevention Tips

Burglaries in Austin neighborhoods cost residents over 1.3 million per year in loss of property alone. Most burglaries in your neighborhood are being committed by youths 18 and under. They are not skilled professionals, but they will take advantage of an easy target. Don't make it easy for them.

1. Install a deadbolt lock.

Deadbolts are usually locked with a key from the outside and a thumb turn on the inside. The cylinder should be pick resistant. Lock your doors every time you leave the house, even if you're leaving for just a few minutes during the day. The most popular times for residential burglaries are weekday daylight hours. In over 1/3 of burglaries, there is no forcible entry-someone forgot to lock the doors.

2. Install solid doors.

Outside doors should be metal or solid hardwood and at least 1 3/4 inches thick. Frames must be made of equally strong material and each door must fit its frame securely.

3. Keep garage doors closed and locked.

4. Secure sliding doors and windows.

Cut a broom handle to the length of the bottom track so that the window or door will not slide open when forced. Also, drill one hole through both casings and sliding window and insert a nail or pin.

5. Secure sash windows.

To prevent wooden sash windows from being pried open, drill a downward sloping hole into the top of the bottom window through and into the bottom of the top window and insert a pin or nail.

To prevent aluminum sash windows from being broken into, purchase a track lock that blocks the window track.

6. Mark your property.

Mark your valuables with an engraver. Marking your property serves as a deterrent to would-be burglars and it helps police in identifying and returning stolen property. Make a property identification list. Put warning stickers on doors and windows.

7. Purchase a burglar alarm.

A home alarm system can be a very effective burglary deterrent and fit into many people's needs. Remember to test your system monthly.

8. Leave a light on.

When leaving on trips, leave a light on in the bathroom. In the bedroom, attach a lamp and radio to a 24-hour electric timer set to go on at dusk and off at your bedtime. Close bedroom drapes or blinds.

9. Use proper exterior lighting.

Place a light over every door. Double cones lights on each corner of the house will also light up windows.

10. Work together with your neighbors.

When you are going to be away, tell trusted neighbors and ask them to watch your property. Have neighbors maintain your yard. When on vacation, have someone cut grass. Shrubbery should not hide neighbors' view of windows or doors. Have someone pick up newspapers and mail. Tell neighbors to call police if they notice anything suspicious.

Austin Energy offers customers one of the country's best solar photovoltaic rebates, at \$4.50 per watt. This pays between 45% and 75% of the cost of installing a system.

For a typical residence, the cost of installing a one kilowatt (1,000 watts) solar photovoltaic system—the smallest considered practical—is between \$6,000 and \$10,000. Austin Energy will rebate \$4,500 (\$4.50 x 1,000 watts) of that.


Austin Energy offers low-cost loans to purchase and install solar electric power systems.

- No prepayment penalty



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

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brought more dramatic changes with a whole new lifestyle that included air-conditioning, drapes at the windows and rugs on the floor. It helped to eliminate mildew in their closets and the need for the small heating units in the kitchen cabinets to keep crackers and cookies fresh. It also made lighting along the canal possible. Bert was assigned the job of helping to design and install the lights that still line the Canal today. On one of his treks along the banks of the Canal, he dashed into a telephone booth to avoid a downpour and encountered a hive of bees and was stung so badly that his face swelled up to the size of a basketball.

Bert retired in 1976, and the Schroeter family moved to Austin, TX. On October 13, 1985 the City of Austin named a 12 acre neighborhood park in his honor for all his efforts to keep the land as a park. With all of Austin's growth & development, this little bit of quiet green becomes more rare and important in our daily lives.

For the past 20 years Val Schroeter, Honorary MPNA Board Member, has worked tirelessly on behalf of our beloved Schroeter Park. She has spent countless hours to protect what many people consider our biggest neighborhood asset.
