## Valentine's Day Trivia for 2012


- ♥ 15% of U.S. women send themselves flowers on Valentine's Day.
- ♥ 73% of people who buy flowers for Valentine's Day are men, while only 27% are women.
- ♥ About 1 billion Valentine's day cards are exchanged each year. That's the largest seasonal card-sending occasion of the year, next to Christmas.
- ♥ About 3% of pet owners will give Valentine's Day gifts to their pets.
- ♥ Hallmark has over 1,330 different cards specifically for Valentine's Day. (Continued on page 3)



#### Valentine's Day Trivia for 2012



- ♥ In the United States, 64% do not make plans in advance for a romantic Valentine's Day with their sweethearts.
- ♥ In Victorian times, it was considered bad luck to sign a Valentine's Day card.
- Only the U.S., Canada, Mexico, France, Australia and the United Kingdom celebrate Valentine's Day.
- ♥ Alexander Graham Bell applied for his patent on the telephone, an "Improvement in Telegraphy," on Valentine's Day, 1876.
- ♥ California produces 60 percent of American roses, but the vast number sold on Valentine's Day in the United States are imported, mostly from South America. Approximately 110 million roses, the majority red, will be sold and delivered within a threeday time period.
- ♥ Cupid, another symbol of Valentines Day, became associated with the day because he was the son of Venus, the Roman god of love and beauty. Cupid often appears on Valentine cards holding a bow and arrows because he is believed to use magical arrows to inspire feelings of love.
- ♥ During the late 1800s, postage rates around the world dropped, and the obscene St. Valentine's Day card became popular, despite the Victorian era being otherwise very prudish. As the numbers of racy valentines grew, several countries banned the practice of exchanging Valentine's Days cards. During this period, Chicago's post office rejected more than 25,000 cards on the grounds that they were so indecent, they were not fit to be carried through the U.S. mail.
- ♥ February 14, 270 A.D. : Roman Emperor Claudius II, dubbed "Claudius the Cruel," beheaded a priest named Valentine for performing marriage ceremonies. Claudius II had outlawed marriages when Roman men began refusing to go to war in order to stay with their wives.
- ♥ One single perfect red rose framed with baby's breath is referred to by some florists as a "signature rose," and is the preferred choice given by many on Valentine's Day, anniversarys, or birthdays.
- ♥ Teachers will receive the most Valentine's Day cards, followed by children, mothers, wives, and then sweethearts. Children ages 6 to 10 exchange more than 650 million Valentine's cards with teachers, classmates, and family members.



- ♥ The first photograph of a U.S. President was taken on February 14, 1849 by Matthew Brady in New York City. President James Polk was the subject of the famous picture.
- The first televised tour of the White House aired on February 14 in 1962. First Lady Jackie Kennedy hosted the tour.
- ♥ The most fantastic gift of love is the Taj Mahal in India. It was built by Mughal Emperor Shahjahan as a memorial to his wife, who died in childbirth. Work on the Taj began in 1634 and continued for almost 22 years. It required the labor of 20,000 workers from all over India and Central Asia.
- Wearing a wedding ring on the fourth finger of the left hand dates back to ancient Egypt, where it was believed that the vein of love ran from this finger directly to the heart.

#### Home security when you're not home Information from the Austin Police Department

Most burglars prefer to break into your house when no one is home; therefore anything you can do to make your house appear occupied will discourage burglars from picking your house as their target. Fortunately, it is relatively simple to make your



house appear occupied. Don't leave obvious clues that you are gone.

Don't leave notes on the door advertising you are gone or will be returning at a specific date and time. Make sure someone picks up the newspapers or deliveries. It is best not to cancel any mail or newspaper deliveries because that is letting someone know that you will be gone.

Have a neighbor or friend you trust look after your house while you are gone. Ask them change the drapes or blinds around to appear as if someone is home. Request a neighbor to park their car in your driveway and to move it around occasionally. You can also have your neighbor put their garbage out in front of your house. If you are going to be gone for an extended period time, schedule someone to mow your lawn for you as well.

While it is important for some people to know you will be gone, don't tell everyone. The fewer people that know you will be gone, the better. Ensure you leave a TV or radio on, and have several lamps placed on automatic times.
