Pat was working on the engine of our son's car Sunday afternoon. The car was sitting half in/half out of the garage. (We have a side entrance garage and Pat could not be seen from the street.) A strange man walked up almost into the garage. He didn't see Jim sitting in the car. Jim got out of the car and asked the man what he wanted. His reply was, "Nothing." He went on to say what a nice car it was. (It really is a very old car.) Jim asked him again what he wanted. "Nothing." Jim told him he'd better leave. The man left and walked west on North Bend into the neighborhood. Just wanted everyone to know. Don't leave your garage doors up; and don't be in the garage by yourself where you can hear someone walk up. I think we may talk to the neighbors about trimming their hedges.

P.S.: Maria Olivaries reported that her daughter's radio was stolen out of the driveway sometime at night or early morning, just a couple of days after the attempted break in at 1101 Rebecca Drive. He now keeps his garage doors closed, which is good advice for everyone!

P.S. One of the ladies on our street has failing eyesight and doesn't always see the mailman go by. Pat has attached a flip-out flag on our mailbox so we know when the postman comes. A fairly inexpensive electronic sensor can be attached to the door of the mailbox that sends an audible signal to a remote in the house when the mailbox is opened.
